Indianola Schools Partner with Community as RAGBRAI® 'Rolls into 'Nola'

The Indianola Community School District will be at the center of the July 23 overnight stop by RAGBRAI, from hosting the first town meeting on May 21, to providing the campgrounds for thousands of riders as they make their way across the state.

"Indianola Middle School will serve as the primary campground for the night, with more than 5,000 riders pitching tents on the school grounds," said Roger Netsch, co-chair of the executive committee that oversees housing.

"The Indianola Middle School and High School parking lots will house RVs that come with riders," said Netsch, "and all of the elementary schools in the community will host campsites, as well," he said.

"When they say 'it takes a village,' hosting RAGBRAI is so much more," said Netsch. "We owe a big thank you to all the schools for stepping forward to help meet RAGBRAI's needs."

The first RAGBRAI-related project will be a town meeting, set for the Indianola High School Auditorium on Tuesday, May 21, at 7 p.m. Everyone in the community is invited to the meeting to learn more about the overnight stop and how they can be a part of the event.

Indianola High School Welcomes New Administrators



Middle School is Going One-to-One in 2019-20

ndianola Middle School is excited to extend our Digital Learning Environment for the 2019-20 school year. Next year all 6th-8th grade students will receive 11" Chromebooks to be used for curriculum, assessment, and instruction. The Chromebooks will be rolled out at the beginning of the school year in August. No fees will be associated with the Chromebooks when students receive them.

We ask that you make sure to read and review the information in the Indianola Student Handbook and the Indianola Device Acceptance Agreement before students return to school, both are located on the district website. The device acceptance agreement is included in the online student registration process. Parents will electronically sign the agreement, allowing students to take a device home.

This is an exciting time for Indianola Middle School as we prepare our students to be competitive in a global market by utilizing the Digital Learning Environment. The access to this technology will have a positive impact on our students by increasing engagement and educational outcomes. The 21st Century Technology Literacy skills are at the forefront of this adoption as we look to engage our students in critical thinking, collaboration, and communication.

School Resource Officer

Plans are moving forward to have a school resource officer (SRO) in Indianola CSD next school year. The officer will spend the majority of his time at the high school with some time also being spent in the middle school. Patrol officers will continue to make stops at district elementary schools as well. The school resource officer will be a cooperative effort between the city and school with the cost being shared.

There has been a wealth of excellent conversation and research around the SRO position. The officer will not function as a school disciplinarian but will be available to handle issues for which officers would have been called to respond to the school in the past. The main goals with the SRO program are to ensure safe schools, build positive relationships between the IPD and students, assist with education on topics the officer would have expertise in, and serve as deterrent for illegal behavior. The officer will be trained in a variety of areas, such as adolescent development, de-escalation techniques, and diversity.

"The SRO is a position that we are excited about establishing," said Indianola Police Chief Dave Button. "IPD and ICSD have partnered in other endeavors, but nothing as significant as this. I'm confident the community will embrace the positive role the SRO will bring to our schools by serving not only as a law enforcement officer, but as an educator, informal counselor, and mentor as well."

Online Learning Program Update

ICSD is hard at work on efforts to build our online learning program at Indianola High School. Beginning with the 2019-20 school year, IHS will offer both blended courses and our new self-paced courses. We are on track to meet our goal of offering a more rigorous online diploma and credit recovery program that matches what other IHS students are receiving in the classroom.

Blended Learning

Sixteen teachers have completed a four-course training on blended learning. In blended courses, teachers strategically determine the best use of both physical and online class time with students.

They intentionally utilize online learning in order to carve out time for small group learning, one-on-one help, or other activities during face-to-face instruction. Students might watch a video lecture as homework so that class time can be spent on collaborative learning or applying learning to higher-order tasks. Blended learning is not an online class. Students in blended courses do some work online but still attend class in a traditional classroom during a designated class period. Beginning this year, students could choose a blended environment for some courses when they registered for next year. Blended offerings will be available in English, math, science, social studies, world language, and art.

Self-Paced Course Development

Self-paced courses are completely online and allow students to move through specific learning and tasks at their own pace. These courses are ideal for students who have special health or scheduling concerns that prevent them being successful within the traditional school day or students who need to recover credit for courses they have failed. Small pilot groups of students are currently enrolled in courses developed by our own teachers. The courses ensure the same core content and performance expectations as the traditional classroom but in an online format. Teachers are using pilot groups to test the rigor, workflow, and learning success of students. They will revise course content and assessments as needed. These courses will be ready for full deployment in Fall 2019:

Facilitated Online Course Training and Development

Facilitated online courses are what most people picture when they think of online learning as they are common in the workplace and post-secondary institutions. Facilitated courses run on a semester calendar like a traditional course and allow students to interact with both the teacher and other students. Teachers deliver instruction, set deadlines, and design collaborative learning completely online. Facilitated courses may utilize video conferencing, discussion boards, and online collaboration tools. Teachers may also offer office hours if students need to meet with them for extra help. Facilitated courses allow students to take a wide variety of courses without physically being present at a designated time. A few teachers are currently finishing up their training and plan to offer facilitated courses by Fall 2020-21.
